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Curriculum In A Nutshell: Room 101 Pre-K & Kinder

Hello parents! My name is Miss Alicia and I'd like to welcome both our new and returning students to room 101.

I hope you all had a wonderful summer and that your child is ready for an exciting year of fun and learning ahead. My assistant, Ms. Mahogany, and I are eager to work with your child and establish a trusting relationship with him/her. My goal is for my students to reach their highest potential this year, but in due course. As Maria Montessori once said, "Follow the child, they will show you what they need to do, what they need to develop in themselves and what area they need to be challenged in."

This month, students will become familiar with the classroom, as well as our daily routine. They will get to know the different



areas of the room from math, language, sensorial, cultural, science, and practical life. They will be reminded of our procedures, such as cleaning up after

themselves, returning activities to where they belong, treating our classroom materials with care, and sitting quietly and patiently during circle time. Care of self will be focused on, which includes washing hands thoroughly, how to clean their face,

and how to use a tissue. Students will also be introduced/reminded of our playground and clean up rules during recess. As students get to know each other, they will be encouraged to practice their social skills and how to communicate with one another in a polite and respectful

manner. Since this is a mixed age class, older students will assist younger students and lead by example.



I encourage all students to arrive to school on time every day. This helps them get back into a routine and also ensures they are present for important lessons at circle time. As some of you may know, I was an assistant teacher at Lodi Montessori for several years prior to taking over room 101 at the



Curriculum In A Nutshell: Room 102 Pre-K & Kinder





Welcome new and returning families to Room 102! My name is Lizzet but I go by Ms. Liz. I have worked in a Montessori setting for the past 6 years, and this will be my second year being Lead Teacher here at LoMo. For those of you who don't know, I was the Early Preschool teacher last year in room 103. I am excited for the opportunity to work with my former students who have graduated onto Pre-k, and also, I am thrilled to meet our new friends that will be joining my class this school year.

I hope you all enjoyed your summer and are ready for a fun-filled year of learning! To begin the school year, we will be reviewing 'grace and courtesy.' We will expand our vocabulary words for 'courtesy,' identifying feelings and appropriate actions. Grace and courtesy is an integral part of the Montessori curriculum beginning in the early childhood classroom. As creator of the Montessori Method, Dr. Maria Montessori states, "Considering the method as a whole, we must begin our work by preparing the child for the forms of social life, and we must attract his attention to these forms." The lessons that help children to learn these social norms (like learning how to stay in their own space during work time, instead of getting into his or her neighbors' space) are taught in order to give them the tools needed to navigate and communicate with classmates. These skills will continue to grow as they build relationships here at school, and will continue to benefit them throughout their life.

This year I have designed my classroom in a way that responds to the child's developmental needs. Children observe carefully and want to participate in the hustle and bustle of life around them. Learning how to be part of society and develop relationships with others is extremely attractive to children. It is a skill I look forward to helping them acquire as we start off our school year. Creating a positive working environment from the get-go is the reason why Montessori students thrive. My main goal



when setting up my classroom is to create an environment in which children will get to move freely throughout their space and choose activities that interest and challenge them. It is also important to provide a setting in which they can easily work with me one-on-one, work independently, or in small groups. The students' environment is set up to liberate their energy for growth and learning. Movement in the classroom will be unrestricted unless it endangers themselves, other people, or their surroundings. There are five areas in my classroom your child will discover. These areas are: Practical life, Sensorial, Mathematics, Language, and Cultural Studies. As their lead teacher, I will be challenging my students by changing out the activities on my shelves that correspond to our studies each month. I ask that parents bring their child to school on time, as being late may disrupt their learning experience. Curriculum In A Nutshell: Room 103 Early Preschool

I am so excited to start the new school year, I don't even know where to begin! How about a grand welcoming to our LoMo families into the 2018-2019 school year! Cheers! I hope you and the little ones are looking forward to a year long journey of learning and fun. The children in my classroom (ages 2.5-3) are still learning independence while also possessing an egocentric way of thinking. That being said, I will try my best to support their eagerness to take on challenges, while also providing the guidance needed. It's tough being a toddler, and at times, this big new place with lots of unfamiliar faces can be overwhelmingly scary. As your child's teacher, I can reassure you that my aids and I will help your child feel as comfortable as possible as we foster a nurturing environment for each individual child. In this Montessori classroom, my goal is to prepare my students for a lifetime love for learning. That being said, our academics are laid out throughout the classroom so that your child can explore his/her own individual interests. My students will *not* be forced to learn to count 1-10 or to be able to recognize letters. Instead, they will be guided to explore those concepts during job time, when they

are ready. I will be introducing these concepts and so much more throughout the school year. This month however, "grace and courtesy" will be a main focus. Other important areas of focus will include: care of self, others and the environment, rules and procedures, respect for both people and materials, good hygiene habits, and self-awareness skills to strengthen their ability to accurately judge their own performance and behavior and to respond appropriately.



Toileting is another important part of my classroom, and it will be encouraged in various, positive

ways. We will be using a "timing" method in which children are prompted to use the potty every so often, depending on where that child is in their toileting stage. Potty and diapering times will always be logged while a child is still in the early learning stages. When a diapered child begins to show signs that he/she is ready for pottytraining, it is important that parents and teachers communicate. Both must work together on a plan for how to help that child learn to start using the toilet.

The art area in my classroom is always available for your child to explore. Your child's artwork may not look like much to some, but for them, it was



an accomplishment, and for this reason I ask that my parents please not throw away any of their work at school. Not only is this a disservice to your child, but it may be disrespectful to their teacher.

I would like to wrap up the month of August with learning the famous "This is my school" and "I celebrate my family" songs, as well as other fun Montessori songs. I wish everyone a smooth school year and look forward to meeting all of my new families. If you have any questions or concerns regarding your child, please talk to me when you get the chance. Reminders!

To ensure a smooth start to the new school year, please be reminded of the following:

- Check the bulletin board and emails for important school information, upcoming events and your child's snack day
- Take home your child's daily work
- Ensure your child has an extra set of clothes at school (shirts, pants, socks, underwear, etc.)
- Label your child's belongings. Lodi Montessori is not responsible for lost or stolen items
- Chap-stick, lotion, hand sanitizers, OTC meds are not allowed in your child's cubby. Please hand it to a teacher for proper storage
- Lodi Montessori is a peanut and tree-nut free school zone

New? Consistency is Key.

During the first few weeks of school it is understandable that you, as the parent, might be apprehensive about leaving your child. Please feel free to speak to a staff member about using the observation area to watch as your child works within the classroom. Remember, your apprehension can easily get misinterpreted by the child and make his/her transition into a new school or a new classroom even more difficult.



Many children do experience separation anxiety in a new environment. A staff member will comfort your child until he/she feels comfortable in the classroom environment. A bond will soon develop and your child will establish a routine, learning to trust that you will return at a specific time each day. It is important in the first few weeks of school to maintain consistent drop-off and pick-up times. We will work with you and your child to make the transition as nurturing and positive as possible.
